What do we show on this month's cover? We show a a vintage, Victorian Valentine's Day card! We are all familiar with the modern traditions of St Valentine's Day, cards, chocolates and flowers, but what were the origins of the day? Lupercalia was a pastoral festival in ancient Rome, celebrated annually in February, Shepherds outside the city walls of Rome prayed to the god Lupercus, to keep their flocks safe from marauding wolves. Each year in February the god was thanked in a festival celebrating fertility and the arrival of spring. The highlight was on the 14<sup>th</sup>, when young men would draw the names of maidens, and they would be partners for the duration of the festival – sometimes for life! After Emperor Constantine christianised Rome, pagan activities gradually became eliminated. In the late fifth century, Pope Gelasius I finally suppressed Lupercalia, in which it was believed that the barren would be helped to pregnancy, and the pregnant would be helped through delivery. It was replaced with a festival in memory of a Christian bishop who had been martyred 200 years previously. The emperor Aurelius had imprisoned Valentine for continuing to conduct marriages for Christian soldiers, which was against the law. In prison, the bishop cured his jailer's daughter of blindness, and the two fell hopelessly in love. The bishop was executed on Feb 14 the following year, but on the eve of his death he sent a passionate letter to his love, signed simply "your Valentine" Soon afterwards, the Catholic church declared that 14 February would be kept as the feast day of the martyred St Valentine, patron saint of lovers, epileptics and beekeepers. It was viewed as a lover's festival from the 14<sup>th</sup> century, because it has been suggested that Feb 14 is approx the day that European birds start mating. Young ladies in England would write the names of prospective lovers on slips of paper, before rolling them in clay and placing them in a bowl of water. Whichever name rose to the surface first, would be their Valentine. In Scotland, names were drawn from a hat three times and if the same name appeared each time then marriage would follow. The name of the Valentine was then worn on the sleeve for the remainder of the day. Many superstitions were related to birds seen by young ladies on Valentine's Day. If she saw a blackbird, she would marry a clergyman; a goldfinch, a millionaire; a redbreast, a sailor; a crossbill, a quarrelsome man. A wryneck would condemn the poor lady to the fate of an old maid. To improve their chances of finding true love, single girls could run round a church twelve times without stopping; lav bay leaves sprinkled in rosewater on their pillow; or even eat a hard-boiled egg at midnight, including shell . A lady approaching old-maid status was advised to try all of the above! The legacy of St Valentine has survived long after his death. There was such an uproar over his execution among the Christian community in Rome, that the authorities had to bury his body guickly to avoid a riot. But three of his followers found his body and took him to Terni in Umbria, the city of his birth, and where he served as a bishop. He is perfectly embalmed in the Basilico de S Valentino. Young lovers still travel to the tomb to ask his blessing and the city throws a month long festival in his honour every year in February.

**Interesting February Dates:** On the 1<sup>st</sup>, in 1901, the royal yacht Alberta brought the body of the 82 year old Queen Victoria into Portsmouth harbour in readiness for the iourney to London for her funeral on the following day. She had died at her home Osborne House, on the Isle of Wight on 22 January. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> in 1665 British forces captured New Amsterdam, the centre of the Dutch colony in North America. The trading settlement on the island of Manhattan was renamed New York, in honour of the Duke of York, its new governor, who later became King James II. On the 10th in 1354, students at Oxford University fought a street battle with local residents, resulting in several deaths and many injured. On the 13th in 1688, the "glorious revolution" brought the protestant king William of Orange and his wife Mary (daughter of James II) to the throne of England after the Catholic King James II fled to France. On the 22<sup>nd</sup>, in 1797, over 1000 French troops attempted to invade Britain, landing on the Welsh coast. The brave ladies of Fishquard saved the day! Thank you Jemima Nicholas, who received a lifetime pension for her efforts! Four days later, on the 26th, the Bank of England issued the first ever one pound note, which was hand written, on one side only, with the name of the payee, the date and the signature of the issuing cashier. This in part was a result of the panic in London, over the gold shortages, caused by the French revolutionary wars!

**Sunday 8th January**: The communal service in St Ffraid's, to meet assistant bishop Mary was well attended. The renewal of baptismal vows was powerful in its simplicity. Days later, we heard that Mary had been elected to become **Bishop of Llandaff**! We wish her and her family every blessing in their new life.
