February is considered to be merely a "waiting for spring" month, but three events internationally help to raise its profile! Mardi Gras (French for Fat Tuesday,) falls this year on 13 Feb. This is 47 days before Easter, and is the equivalent of Shrove Tuesday, (Pancake Day,) in that all rich, fatty foods must be eaten before the start of the Lenten fast. The Carnival season begins at Epiphany, (Three Kings Day,) and ends on Shrove Tuesday. Most extravagantly celebrated in New Orleans and Alabama in America's 'deep south', it includes parades, masked balls and general feasting and drinking. Chinese New Year: The first day of celebration is moveable – it takes place on the new moon which appears between 21 January and 20 February. This year it occurs on 10th February. As each country in the world has its own Chinese community, it will have its own legends and particular way to celebrate! The evening preceding the New Year's Day is frequently regarded as an occasion for Chinese families to gather for the annual reunion dinner. Ancestors are ritually worshipped on that day. It is also a tradition for every family to thoroughly clean their house, in order to sweep away any previous ill fortune and to make way for incoming good luck. Businesses are expected to pay off any outstanding debts before New Year's Eve. Many different legends exist, to explain the annual spring festival. One is that it started with a mythical beast called Nian, which lived either under the sea or in the mountains. It would eat villagers, especially children, in the middle of the night. One year an older man stepped up saying he could avenge the beast. He had discovered that the beast feared the colour red and fire crackers. From that day on, it has been the custom to use these two elements at each spring festival, and the beast has never been seen since! Another ancient tradition for New Year's Eve is one of all night revelry. Friends' homes are visited and good luck greetings are wished for each house. Cards are exchanged and children are given gifts of money, sealed in red envelopes. The fifteenth day of the festival is celebrated with lanterns. It is also favoured by those seeking a romantic partner, similar to our Valentine's Day, and often marks the end of the Chinese New Year. Leap Year: The emperor Julius Caesar is responsible for our leap year, containing an extra day, occurring every four years. The earth takes slightly longer than 365 days to orbit once around the sun, so in order to line up the calendar year with the solar year, he came up with the idea of the leap year! Without it, the calendar would gradually fall out of line with the seasons. Even after the Julian calendar evolved into the Gregorian calendar in 1582, the tradition continued. The Irish Saint Bridget, supposedly convinced St Patrick to go against tradition and to allow women to propose marriage on leap year day. When the tradition was adopted in Scotland, Queen Margaret of Scotland in 1288 passed a law that if a man did not accept, he must pay a fine of between £1 and the price of a silk gown! In that country too, any lady intending to propose has to give the man fair warning by wearing a red petticoat! In Denmark, a man who refuses a proposal in leap year, has to buy for the lady twelve pairs of gloves, supposedly to hide her shame of not being able to show off an engagement ring! In Finland, the price of a refusal, is enough fabric to make a skirt! In Greece it is considered unlucky to get married on leap year day. Superstition maintains that those who do are more likely to divorce. In the US, the New Mexico town called Anthony is considered to be the leap year capitol of the world! Every four years those born on 29 Feb, from all over the world, gather to celebrate their unusual birth date. A buffet meal with wine is served in a local vineyard. "Leapers" and their plus one are served free – everyone else has to pay! In southern Germany, age old tradition encourages girls to leave small birch trees decorated with ribbons on the doorstep of the boys they dream about! In 1928, Harry Craddock, a bartender at the Savoy in London, created a Leap Year Day Cocktail from Grand Marnier, sweet vermouth, gin and a dash of lemon juice. This bitter sweet concoction perfectly captures the spirit of this very bizarrely different day! Happy Leap Year Day everyone!

2 Feb - Candlemas! In medieval times, Candlemas, was considered to be the last day of Christmas, so decorations could be left until that date. Why? Also called the Feast of the **Purification of the Virgin Mary**, it was the date on which she was ritually purified – 40 days after the birth of our Lord. Apparently, ritual purification of a woman forty days after the birth of a son, and eighty days after a daughter, can be traced back to the time of Moses. At the end of this time, she would bring to the priest a one year old lamb to be a burnt offering, (for very poor people, a small amount of flour would be accepted instead,) and a young pigeon as a sin offering. Her cleanliness would then be restored. The day is also remembered as the **Presentation of Christ in the Temple**, the introduction of the infant to Simeon and Anna, and the thanksgiving for the survival of mother and child. The Church candles intended to be used throughout the year, were also generally blessed on Candlemas, to underpin the message that Christ was the light of the world! **I leave my illuminated nativity up until Candlemas**, **bringing cheer during these gloomy depressing winter months. It's great company, therapeutic and spiritual. Why not try it next year**?
