What do we show on our cover? The wild and magnificent Bardsey Island, our destination as we continue walking together on pilgrimage. The North Wales Pilgrims Way starts at Basingwerk, a Grade 1 listed abbey near Holywell, in Flintshire. It then travels eastwards and ends at Aberdaron, on the Llyn peninsula, a total of 136 miles. The final part of the route, which is optional and weather dependent, is the two mile boat trip to Bardsey island, which starts at Porth Meudwy, about a mile away along the coastal foot path from Aberdaron. This legendary island of 20,000 saints including Saint Deiniol of Bangor, is the fourth largest offshore island in Wales, and is our cover feature. This pilgrimage has been popular since the 7th century, linking saints associated with Holywell, Gwytherin, Clynnog Fawr and Bardsey. St Winifred or Winifride was a 7th century Welsh Christian woman of the nobility. Prince Caradoc wanted to marry her, but having been taught religion by her uncle Beuno, she felt drawn to the monastic life. In approximately 630 AD, she refused the proposal, but Caradoc became angry, tried to rape her and then beheaded her. Legend has it that her head rolled down the hill, as an earthquake erupted. The earth opened up and a stream of water burst forth from where she fell. St Beuno came and placed her head back on her body, prayed and restored her to life. To this day, the waters of this spring have healing properties. Although mostly associated with this 'holy well' in Holywell, as well as the church of St Beuno in the same area, Winifride spent the latter part of her life as abbess of a convent in the remote village of Gwytherin, near Abergele, where the church still bears her name. Moving eastwards, Beuno founded a celtic monastery in Clynnog, (the place of holly trees) on the north coast of the Llyn peninsula, between Caernarfon and Pwllheli. In present times, there is an ancient church named after him, which was an important stopping place for pilgrims heading for Bardsey Island. A prestigious religious site since the 6th century, it is believed that St Cadfan founded his monastery on the island, which became a major centre of pilgrimage in medieval times. Three of these were said to be as spiritually beneficial as one to Rome. Henry VIII dissolved the monastery in 1537, but the island still remains an attraction for pilgrims in modern times, and marks the end of the North Wales Pilgrims Way. "To go on pilgrimage really means to step out of ourselves in order to encounter God"

Pilgrimage is the way we journey. In our physical walking we take spiritual steps using the environment, history, time and sometimes company of others to deepen our knowing and loving God. The space and time allows us to go further and for longer than is usually the case. The ancient trail from Holywell to Bardsey has a rich heritage that is perfect for this kind of encounter. The beauty of the coastline and stop off points along the way are replete with stories of those who have gone before us like Beuno who founded a community at the edge of the Lleyn. It's sometimes said that the point of this journey is not to arrive. I'm not sure that is quite true but I understand what is being said: it isn't the end point which is most important but the journey itself, what takes place along the way. Anyone who takes this journey, whether literally or virtually, will find that they are not alone. Like those first disciples who walked from Jerusalem to Emmaus, they will find Christ at their side, speaking to them, opening the Scriptures and touching their hearts with the fire of love.' Thanks to Bishop Andy John, who has kindly added these insightful words to accompany our own piece.

Interesting historical July dates. On the 1st, in 1838, British scientist Charles Darwin presented a paper to the Linnean Society in London, on his theory of the evolution of species and natural selection. On the 6th, in 1535, former favourite of King Henry VIII Sir Thomas More, was executed after refusing to recognise the King as the head of the Church. On the 11th, in 1690, deposed Roman Catholic King of England James II was defeated by the then current protestant king, William III or William of Orange, at the river Boyne, Ireland, On the 12th, in 1910, British pilot Charles Stewart Rolls, 33, died after his French built biplane crashed at a flying competition in Bournemouth, Dorset. He was a partner in the Rolls-Royce car manufacturing company. On the 13th in 1923, the British Parliament passed a law banning the sale of alcohol to under-18's. On the 19th, in 1545, King Henry VIII looked on as his newly refitted flagship the Mary Rose sank in the Solent, off England's south coast, with the loss of 700 lives. She was raised again in 1982. On the 21st in 1969, the Eagle landed on the moon and US astronaut Neil Armstrong was the first man in history to walk on its powdery surface. On the 23rd in 1940, the Local Defence Volunteers changed its name to the Home Guard. (Remember Dad's Army!) The one million-strong force, which included many World War One veterans, was intended to form Britain's last line of defence against the expected German invasion. On the 29th in 1588, the Spanish Amada was sighted off the coast of Cornwall. The English fleet under the command of Charles Howard and Francis Drake set sail from Plymouth, to establish the birth of British naval supremacy.
