What do we show on our cover ? As none of us can foresee a holiday over the next few weeks, let us sit in our chairs, and enjoy a wander along the Pilgrims Way. What is a pilgrimage? It is a spiritual journey, a time set apart from everyday life, to be spent listening to God. This pilgrimage, is perhaps the most well known in Britain, and has been in use since 1172. The distance of 153 miles, would have taken fifteen days to complete, on foot. It begins at the shrine of St Swithun, Anglo Saxon bishop and patron saint of Winchester who was born in 800 AD. It ends at the two shrines in Canterbury, one of St Augustine, who brought Christianity to Britain in 597 and became that city's first archbishop, the other of Thomas Becket. According to tradition, if it rains on Saint Swithun's bridge (Winchester) on his feast day (15 July) it will continue to rain for forty days. After his death, his shrine was a site of numerous miracles in the Middle Ages. The brutal murder of Archbishop Thomas Becket in Canterbury Cathedral on December 29, 1170, transformed him into one of the most venerated saints in Western Christendom, and his shrine instantly became a pilgrimage site. The ancient trackway between the two cities, was probably in existence as far back as the stone age, which ended around 2000 BC, and was also widely used in Roman times. Starting in Winchester, following the Roman road east to Farnham, pilgrims in the middle ages would have roughly followed what is now the A31, through Guildford, Dorking and Reigate. At Cuxton they would have crossed the River Medway, then on to Rochester, turned south east across the top of the Downs, and then north to follow the valley of the Great Stour river and on to Canterbury. Along some stretches, the pilgrims' route left the ancient trackway to encompass religious sites, such as St Martha on the Hill, the only church in Surrey to be on the Pilgrim's Way and St Catherine's chantry chapel, built in the early 14th century, some 500 metres to the south. In

2020, a small sandstone cave was discovered during work on the railway line between Guildford and Portsmouth. Several decorative niches carved into the walls are believed to be part of a medieval shrine dating to the 14th century. At Reigate the 13th century chapel of St Thomas and a hospice were built for the pilgrims' use, even though they were not actually on the route. Boxley Abbey, four miles NE of Maidstone, a Cistercian monastery founded in 1146 was another recognised detour. It really is a route packed with intrigue and medieval history! I leave you with a beautiful quotation from the previous Pope Benedict: **"To go on pilgrimage really means to step out of ourselves in order to encounter God"**

We hope that you will also enjoy the next pilgrimage that will feature in the July edition. The North Wales Pilgrim Way stretches from Holywell to Bardsey. Andy John, our Bishop, has kindly provided some insightful words which will accompany the feature. He says "hello" to everyone, and continues to pray for each one of us every morning!

God's guidance is like a flashlight in a tunnel. It doesn't shine on all corners at once but gives you enough light for the next step. May God's grace, mercy and abundant blessings be upon you all today and always.

We will keep you regularly updated as to our plans, <u>although the timing of some of these will depend on when we are able to hold church services again.</u> Please bear with us. **For more information**, **you are welcome to contact any member of our team.** **Interesting historical June dates.** On the 8th in 1042, Harthacnut, King of England and Denmark, died drunk; he was succeeded in England by his adopted heir, Edward the Confessor, and in Denmark by Magnus, King of Norway. On the 8th in 1949 George Orwell's novel 'Nineteen Eighty-Four' was published. It was a bleak political account of the future, in which big government had created a destructive totalitarianism which denied both human values and the truth. The novel made a major impact - such that it contributed the phrase 'Big Brother' to the language - and was seen as an attack on the Soviet Union. Those who have read it think it was prophetic and ahead of its time. On the 11th, in 1509, in a private ceremony at the Palace of Placentia, Greenwich, the 18 year old English King Henry VIII married his former sister-in-law Catherine of Aragon, the first of his six wives. On the 19th in 1917, in the midst of World War 1 the British royal family renounced their German names (Saxe-Coburg-Gotha) and titles, and adopted the name of Windsor. On the 25th, in 1797, Admiral Horatio Nelson was wounded in the arm in a battle with the French and the limb amputated. This followed the loss of sight in his right eye some three years earlier.
