What do we show on this month's cover? In St Cybi's Church, Holyhead, we are proud to introduce the stained glass window showing Christ the Good Shepherd, with St Peter and St John – known as the **Pharmacist's window**. This three light window by the artist John J Jennings, whose glass workshop was in Clapham Road, Fulham, South London, was installed in 1904, in the south wall of the south aisle, in memory of Theophilus Jones Roberts, who died in May of that year. A pharmacist by profession, he worked during the week at the large and impressive Medical Hall, on the top corner of Boston Street, now a newsagent and convenience store. Our older readers may recall that the interior of the original shop was typically lined with mahogany, containing myriads of small drawers and bottles labelled with strange names. The toiletries and perfumes provided the most wonderful smells, and the window displays included magnificent tall stopper-ed bottles containing coloured liquids. On Sundays, Theophilus was the Sunday School Superintendent. Although Jennings signature can be clearly seen beneath the date of death, the style and design may well have been that of Edward Arthur Fellowes Prynne, an 'outside designer' for Jennings. Prynne studied in London, Antwerp, Florence and Paris before returning to London in the early 1880s. Jesus as the Good Shepherd stands centrally, protectively holding a little woolly lamb, and a shepherd's crook. This may also be seen in the Welsh agricultural context. He is flanked on the left, by a dignified St Peter, shown in older life, with his keys to the kinadom and by St John with his chalice, on the right. The little red dragon may be a Welsh twist to the legend of the poisoned chalice. While in Ephesus, John was offered a glass of poisoned wine. Before drinking, he blessed the drink and the poison came out of the cup in the form of a small green snake. Shown as a young man, St John's blessing would have caused the poison to have dissipated, but it may also refer to the powers of a pharmacist to provide antidotes and cures. Interesting Historical January Dates! New Year's Day – is the most celebrated holiday around the world. On the 1st in 1660 Samuel Pepys began his famous diary in which he chronicled life in London including the Great Plaque of 1664-65 and the Great Fire of 1666. On the 1st in 1801, Ireland was added to Great Britain by an Act of Union thus creating the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. On the 6th in 1066, Harold, Earl of Wessex, was crowned King of England following the death of his brother-in-law Edward the Confessor. Harold II was England's last Anglo-Saxon king. In October of 1066, Harold met the invading army of William the Conqueror at Hastings and died on the field of battle. On the 8th Elvis Preslev (1935-1977) was born in Tupelo. Mississippi, On the 10th in 1863 the world's first underground railway service opened in London, the Metropolitan line between Paddington and Farringdon. On the **15th** in **1535**, Henry VIII became Supreme Head of the Church in England as a result of the Act of Supremacy following his break with Rome. On the 15th in 1559, Elizabeth Tudor, daughter of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn, was crowned as Elizabeth I in Westminster Abbey. On the 16th, French industrialist Andre Michelin (1853-1931) was born in Paris. He started the Michelin Tyre Company in 1888, pioneering the use of pneumatic tyres on cars.
