What do we show on our cover? LENT is the season of 40 days before Easter, recalling the time that Christ spent in the wilderness, in almost total deprivation and self discipline, in preparation for his public ministry. Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen', referring to the days beginning to get longer. In 2020, people may pay lip service to "giving something up for Lent"- chocolates, cakes, cigarettes or wine being the front runners. However, St Thomas Aguinas, Italian Dominican friar (1225 – 1274) had altogether different ideas. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, known as 'black fasts', there was no food to be consumed at all! During the other days of Lent, no food was to be eaten before 3.0pm - the hour of our Lord's death. Water was allowed, but because the water quality was not good, watered down beer and wine was considered healthier. In later times, when tea and coffee became available, these beverages were also allowed. However, animal meats or fats were banned; and so were eggs, milk, cheese, cream, and butter. This is probably what started the popularity of 'Pancake Tuesday', when women needed to use up the eggs and milk before the start of Lent. The name Shrove Tuesday is the past tense of the middle English word to 'shrive', which meant to confess and be absolved from your sins. This tradition is over 1000 years old. Pancake races are thought to have begun in 1445. A woman had lost track of the time on Shrove Tuesday, and was busy cooking pancakes in her kitchen, when she heard the church bell calling the faithful to church for confession. She raced out of her house and ran to church, still holding her frying pan and wearing her apron. On Ash Wednesday, the priest makes the sign of the cross in ashes on the forehead of the faithful, created from burning the palm crosses from the previous year. Ashes had long been a sign of penitence, referred to four times in the Old Testament. So what was allowed during Lent? Bread, vegetables and a little salt – and of course fish – although that was a very limited commodity in those times. Interestingly, in some areas of Ireland, Wales and Germany, beaver tail was considered "fish" and could be consumed during the fast. Even today, in parts of Michigan, USA, muskrat is among the food items approved to be consumed on days of abstinence, including the Fridays of Lent, because the mammal lives in the water. The three days of Easter were even more severe. The Good Friday fast started at sundown on Maundy Thursday and carried on through to noon on Holy Saturday. During the Middle Ages, in England and Wales the fourth Sunday of Lent was known as "Mothering" Sunday, (rejoicing Sunday,) so-called because apprentices and domestic servants were given the day off to go and visit their "mother churches," where they had been baptized. This sometimes coincided with a visit to their birth mother also. Purple is the symbolic colour used in some churches throughout Lent, for drapes and altar frontals. Purple is used for two reasons: firstly because it is associated with mourning and so anticipates the pain and suffering of the crucifixion, and secondly because purple is the colour associated with royalty, and celebrates Christ's resurrection and sovereignty.

<u>Different ideas of what to give up for Lent:</u> Give up complaining- instead show gratitude. Give up worry – trust divine providence. Give up anger – instead show patience. Give up gloom – appreciate the beauty of the world around you. Give up gossiping – focus on the good points of those people being talked about. Give up bigotry - try to be kinder. Give up arrogance - choose humility.

Interesting historical March dates. The name March comes from the Roman god of war, Mars. Impeachment failures are not new! On the 5th, in 1868, the U.S. Senate convened to hear impeachment charges against President Andrew Johnson. The House of Representatives had already agreed the charge. The attempt to remove him failed by just one vote and he remained in office. On the 9th, Italian explorer Amerigo Vespucci (1451-1512) was born in Florence, Italy. He explored South America and the Amazon River, believing he had discovered a new continent. In 1507, a German mapmaker first referred to the lands discovered in the New World as America. On the 12th, in 1994,the Church of England ordained 32 women as its first female priests. In protest, 700 male clergy members and thousands of church members left the church and joined the Roman Catholic Church which does not allow women priests. On the 17th, in 1845, the rubber band was invented. On the 24th, Harry Houdini, (1874-1926) was born (as Erik Weisz) in Budapest, Hungary. He went to the U.S. with his family as an infant, worked as a magician, then became a world famous escape artist, known for escaping from chains, handcuffs, straightjackets, locked boxes and milk cans filled with water. He died on Halloween 1926 from a burst appendix.
