What do we show on our cover? This dove is our link to the late spring holiday, Whitsun (White Sunday) or Pentecost (31 May) as it is known within the church. This latter name was based on the Greek version of the Jewish 'Feast of Weeks'- a major spring harvest festival, recalling the Law being given to Moses on Mount Sinai, in the thirteenth century BC. This gift of the commandments, occurred fifty days after the Exodus, which was the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in Eavpt. Commanded by God to free his countrymen from Egyptian bondage, Moses approached the phar-aoh several times, and each time his request was refused. In retribution, God then unleashed ten separate plaques onto the Egyptians, the final one was the slaying of every first born son. The Israelites however were instructed to paint their door frames with lambs' blood, so that the angel of death could recognise and "Passover" each Jewish household. Moses made plans to lead hundreds of thousands of his people to safety, but soldiers were sent to bring them back. At the edge of the Red Sea, as the Egyptian army was bearing down on the fleeing Jews, a miracle occurred. God caused the sea to part, allowing the hunted to cross safely. The sea closed behind them, causing the Egyptians to drown. Over thirteen hundred years later, the apostles and other disciples were celebrating this festival, 50 days after Easter Day, when the Holy Spirit descended on them. It sounded like a very strong wind, and it looked like tongues of fire. The apostles then found themselves speaking in foreign languages, inspired by the Holy Spirit. It is often referred to as the birthday of the church, and falls on the tenth day after Ascension Thursday – which is the physical departure of Christ from earth into the presence of God in heaven. Although the events of Passover and Easter are separated in time by many hundreds of years, nowadays, the two events are often celebrated within days of each other.

This is a Mothers Union prayer, supplied by a member from Leeds, and suggested by Janice for these challenging times: Most merciful God, in the midst of disaster we look to you in hope and trust, acknowledging that there is much in life beyond our present understanding. Accept our compassion for the suffering, bless those who are working for their relief, show us what we can do to share in their task, as servants of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

We are very grateful to everyone who is telephoning others right now. So much happiness, comfort and encouragement is being shared. We have lots of time now, so why not pick up the phone, and make someone's day—please?

The Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem is closed, allegedly only for the second time ever. The previous time was during the Black Death!

Interesting historical May dates. On the 2nd in 1611, the Authorised version of the King James Bible was first published, becoming the standard in the English language. On the 5th, in **1821**. Napoleon Bonaparte died aged 51, in exile on the British island of St Helena. On the 6th, in 1954. British Roger Bannister was the first man to run a mile in under 4 minutes. On the 11th, in 973, King Edgar the Peaceful was crowned at Bath. On the 11th, songwriter Irving Berlin (1888-1989) was born as Israel Isidore Baline, in Tyumen, Russia. The family moved to New York, and after the death of his father he started singing in saloons and on street corners to help the family financially. Although he could not read or write musical notation, he became one of America's greatest songwriters, best known for songs such as White Christmas. On the 16th, in 1943, RAF Lancaster bombers caused chaos to the Nazi German industry, by destroying two large dams. Dr Barnes Wallis' bouncing bombs skimmed the surface of the water to reach their target. On the 21st, in 1894, the Manchester Ship Canal was officially opened by Queen Victoria. On the 23rd in 878 the Saxon King Alfred defeated the Danes at Edington in Wiltshire. As part of the peace agreement, the Danish king Guthrum accepted Christianity. On the 24th, in 1809, Dartmoor Prison in Devon was opened to house French prisoners of war. On the 26th in 735, the Venerable Bede, English monk and historian, died having just translated St John into Anglo Saxon. On the 27th in **1657**, Lord Protector Oliver Cromwell refused parliament's offer of the title King of England.

May Day. May Day is traditionally a secular holiday usually celebrated on 1 May. This year it will take place on Monday 4 May. It goes back to Roman times, when Flora, the goddess of flowers and spring was venerated. Maypole dancing started at that time, when Romans chopped down young trees, to dance around in honour of this goddess. Some other old customs celebrating life and fertility survive to this day, including Morris dancing, which can be traced back a mere 600years! May Day thrives on unusual costumes, one of the most interesting being 'Jack in the Green' It is believed that he represents the 'Green Man', a symbol of fertility, wearing a foliage covered framework! In some parts of the country, he takes on the 'frost queen', to ensure a good summer! In Edinburgh, the 'fire festival' marks the end of the winter, and welcomes in the summer. Padstow in Cornwall encourages merriment, with their Hobby Horses parade, in which two fearsomely masked men, fight it out on the streets, followed by musicians, drummers and dancers. Berwick upon Tweed follow a custom from 1438 – representatives from England and Scotland meet to decide where one country ends and the other begins! Apparently the Helston Floral dance is bigger than Christmas! Think carnival, flowers and of course the late Sir Terry Wogan!
