What do we show on this month's cover? The Cenotaph at Whitehall, London, as it often looks on the second Sunday in November - Remembrance Sunday. The WW1 Armistice was the ceasefire that ended hostilities between the Allies and Germany at 11.0am on the 11th of November 1918. This day was initially called Armistice Day. The literal meaning of armistice is a truce, or an agreement to stop fighting for a certain period of time. This did not end the first World War itself, but it was the agreement which stopped the fighting on the Western Front , while the terms of the permanent peace were discussed. The time limit had to be extended many times, and the final agreement was signed the following year, in June 1919, at the Treaty of Versailles, and registered with the League of Nations four months later. Remembrance Day (also known as Poppy Day) evolved from the original Armistice day. The two minute silence, in gratitude for sacrifice, was inaugurated by King George V in the grounds of Buckingham Palace in 1919, and has since been observed to remember armed forces members killed in the line of duty. Many Commonwealth countries sound the Last Post, (which marked the end of a military day) followed by silence, then Reveille, which was the first call of the morning. This ritual ensured that the dead were watched over at night, so that they were not mutilated by the enemy. It was a pledge to guard their honour. Next Remembrance Day, please remember this – it's music with significance, and could have been one of your ancestors! The laying of wreaths signalling high honours, goes back to ancient Greece and Rome. The Royal British Legion was founded in May, 1921. Poppies were then made from silk. Apparently poppies were the only flowers that grew in Flanders field after the conflict. In the first year, £106,000 was raised to help those affected by war, from the sale of 9 million poppies. By 1922, a factory had been set up to enable disabled former soldiers to make poppies - this is still operational today! It provides support for any member of the armed forces who served in any capacity. The annual march past through the streets of London , of ex service personnel who defended our freedom and protected our way of life, in WW2 and subsequent conflicts, takes place this year on 14 Nov (the Sunday closest to 11 Nov.) It is a poignant physical reminder of the British and Commonwealth personnel, who served and made the ultimate sacrifice. Many other countries apart from the Commonwealth observe these November remembrances. Belgium, France (blue cornflower rather than a poppy), Hong Kong, Israel, Dublin, US (called Veterans Day ,to include those from other conflicts), Serbia, and Poland (where it is known as Independence Day.) Australia and New Zealand celebrate remembrance day on ANZAC day - 25 April. Many of us find healing through music, in the British Legion Festival of Remembrance, which takes place in the Royal Albert Hall, London, usually on the Saturday evening of Remembrance weekend. This has happened each year since 1923, and was initially broadcast on radio in 1927, later transferring to television. Initially intended to honour those who died in the Great War, it now includes the war dead of more recent conflicts, and features music and performances by all three of the armed services, as well as world famous quest singers and musicians. The two minute silence, and release of poppy petals from the roof are both extremely emotional and humbling.

They have gone no further from us than to God, and God is very near!

Interesting dates in the month of November: On the 1<sup>st</sup> in 1858, after the Indian Mutiny, Queen Victoria became ruler of India, replacing the reign of the East India Company. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> in 1936, the worlds first regular TV service was started by the BBC. An estimated 100 TV owners tuned in. On the 4<sup>th</sup> in 1843, the 5.5 metre statue of Lord Nelson was hauled to the top of the 60 metre column in Trafalgar Square in London. Local historian, and former churchwarden, George tells us that this church is the fifth church in the village, dedicated to the female saint, and was completed in 1931 by builder John Jones, who then handed the keys to the vicar of Holyhead. It was opened at 3.0pm on April 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1932 by the Bishop of Bangor. George has written an interesting history of the church, together with a brief illustrated companion book outlining a total of 18 churches in Wales, dedicated to St Brigid. Both are on sale, either in St Ffraid or directly from the author, who still lives in the village.
