What do we show on this month's cover? This framed assortment of slate etchings, were originally found within the church, and can now be seen on the wall inside Eglwys y Bedd, the building on the left before the gate and path leading from the arch to St Cybi's church. The one on the left shows the date 1733, with a few lines scratched below. The one on the right shows the soles of two shoes and a hand with four lines of inscription in between, separated by straight lines within a square frame. There is a letter **W**, figures**78** and the possible date **1783**. On the wrist of the hand there is a straight line with the letters **DA**. The lower slate shows a sailing ship with the initials and date beneath, **EW 1799**. To the upper left there is a heart with the initial E. The images are unclear, and probably date from the 18th century, and are believed to be the work of visiting seafarers, who traditionally carved images of shoes and hand to guarantee a safe return to port. Whaling has been around since 3000BC, and was a very dangerous occupation. These men could not work at night, so had much more free time than other sailors. Engraving on whale ivory, bone and seashell, by seafarers with crude sailing needles during slack periods in the 18th and 19th century, was a common pastime and became known as Scrimshaw work, possibly after the surname of one of the originators of the craft. The movement of the ship, and the skill of the artist, produced drawings of varying levels detail and artistry. Candle black, soot or tobacco juice was used to accentuate the view of the design. Our slate images could be a derivation of the same skill. Grateful thanks to Tom Clifton for the images and help with the text.

St Ffraid, will be open daily during August, between 10—4, for quiet contemplation.





Interesting historical August dates On the **3rd**, in **1492**, Christopher Columbus set sail from Palos, Spain, seeking a westerly route to the Far East. Instead he landed on October 12th in the Bahamas, thinking it was an outlying Japanese island. On the **16th**, in **1896**, gold was discovered in Rabbit Creek, a tributary of the Klondike River in Alaska, resulting in the Great Gold Rush. On the **17th**, American frontiersman Davy Crockett (**1786**-1836) was born in Hawkins County, Tennessee. He was a farmer, scout and politician who perished at age 49 during the final heroic defence of the Alamo in Texas. On the **26th**, in **1883**, one of the most catastrophic volcanic eruptions ever recorded occurred on the Indonesian island of Krakatoa. Explosions were heard 2,000 miles away and tidal waves 120 ft. high killed 36,000 persons on nearby islands.
