What do we show on this month's cover? From St Cybi's Church, Holyhead, we are proud to introduce in the north transept, between the organ and the Tudor Rose wall painting, to the left of the pulpit, this beautifully traditional, pre-Raphaelite three light window, made by the Morris Company, from designs by Sir Edward Burne-Jones. The background is sea blue drapery, which is highly appropriate in an island church on a low cliff by the sea. Christ as Love stands centrally, robed in red, wearing the crown of thorns and displaying the stigmata. He holds a living wooden cross, with leaves springing reassuringly from it. He is flanked by the Virgin Mary, deep in prayer and St John the Evangelist, holding out his chalice, - a perfect choice for a memorial window for a vicar. Installed in 1927, it was given by his wife Mary, in memory of the Reverend Thomas Edwin Jones, the last Oxford incumbent of St Cybi, from 1906 until his death on 15th February,1925. His death was reported in the March 1925 edition of the 'Jesus College Magazine', What was the connection between St Cybi's and Oxford University? During the reformation in the 1530s, Henry 8th allowed his supporters Thomas Gwynn and his nephew Rhys Gwynn, to purchase the church land and tithes. In 1648, these were handed over to Jesus College, Oxford for the maintenance of 'two fellows and as many scholars' This meant that the college had the right to claim certain tithes and the power to appoint the vicar. In return the college was expected to keep the chancel in good repair and generally be responsible for the upkeep of the church. This started a long association with Jesus College, which lasted until the early twentieth century, at the time of the formation of the Church in Wales, and helps to explain St Cybi's very fine interior. After the dis-establishment in the early 1920s, all these traditions came to an end. What do we know of Thomas Edwin Jones, born in 1858? He was the eldest son of Thomas Jones, of Llannon, Cardiganshire, who was a gentleman by birth and a sailor by profession. Thomas Edwin Jones was admitted to Jesus College on 1 Feb. 1878, aged 20, and gained his BA in 1880, followed by his MA in 1884. He was made a Deacon of Bangor in 1881, a Priest in Bangor in 1882 and vicar of Bangor from 1890 to 1906. He was installed as vicar of St Cybi, Holyhead in 1906 until his death in 1925. With grateful thanks to local historian Dr John Ken Roberts: also to Dr Robin Darwall-Smith, and Rebecca Leeman both of the Jesus College Oxford / Oxford University Archives.

Twelve members of our ministry area, attended St Peter's Church Pwllheli, on Saturday 19th January, for the celebratory mass to venerate and to give thanks for ,the gift of the piece of the veil reputedly worn by the Blessed Virgin Mary as she wept at the foot of the cross. The relic has a full and authentic provenance, (scientifically dated to the time of Christ), and was gifted to the church in gratitude by a pilgrim suffering from terminal cancer. She did not ask for healing, but for strength to accept her death and to find peace. A most up-lifting afternoon!

Interesting Historical February Dates! On the 2nd, in 1665 British forces captured New Amsterdam, the centre of the Dutch colony in North America. The trading settlement on the island of Manhattan was renamed New York in honour of its new governor, the Duke of York. On the 5th, in 1958, parking meters first appeared on the streets of London's exclusive Mayfair district. Meters had been in use in America since 1935. On the 7th Thomas More (1478-1535) was born in London. He was a lawyer, scholar, and held the title Lord Chancellor of England. As a devout Catholic, he refused to acknowledge the divorce of King Henry VIII from Queen Catherine, thereby refusing to acknowledge the King's religious supremacy. He was charged with treason, found guilty and beheaded in 1535, with his head then displayed from Tower Bridge. Four hundred years later, in 1935, he was canonized by Pope Pius XI. On the 11th, in 660 BC, the first Emperor Jimmu acceded to the throne of Japan. Each year the date is celebrated as a national holiday. On the 16th in 1659 a hand written cheque was used for the first time in Britain, as Mr Nicholas Vanacker settled a debt for £400! On the 22nd in 1797, over 1000 French troops attempted to invade Britain landing on the coast at Fishquard. The brave ladies of the town saved the day, overcoming the enemy with pitchforks! On the 28th, in 1953, at lunchtime, an American and British scientist, James Watson and Francis Crick, walked into the Eagle pub in Cambridge, announcing that they had discovered the famous double helix structure of DNA. Crucial to their discovery was the work of another British scientist, Rosalind Franklin, whose X-Ray photographs of DNA gave vital clues to its structure.

Then there was the stole worn by another child, which speaks of bishops serving others, as Jesus calls us all to serve one another. Another child wore on his head his mitre, symbolising the flame of Jesus' love encouraged to grow in each one of our hearts. The Bishop's staff caused the most interest with a number of the younger children insistent on calling it a 'walking stick'! The Bishop persevered and managed to link the staff with shepherds and his role to care for the flock, the people. After the service there was a moment to pause, chat, drink tea and eat cake, quite usual for a Bishop's visit! Once refreshed there was a tour around the school, conversations with teachers and children, and insight into daily routines, opportunities offered and future hopes. Bishop Andy was impressed with all the good work and the dedication of those involved.
