What do we show on this month's cover? As you enter the Stanley Chapel, look up, and you will see what appear to be two flags hanging down. These are the "Colours" of the 6th Battalion, Caernarvon and Anglesey, Royal Welch Fusiliers, T.A. What does this mean? The concept of the "Trooping the Colour" ceremony, which takes place every year on a Saturday in June, in front of our Oueen, at Horse Guards Parade, London, originated in the armies of ancient Egypt, approximately 5000 years ago. The ceremony was later widely used in the armies of the Roman Empire. Later still in Europe during the High Middle Ages (1.000 – 1.250AD), the coats of arms of the army commander were displayed before the troops. Why? In the heat, dust and later smoke of the battlefield, soldiers needed to be able to know and recognise, at the sound of a bugle call, the location of their own regiment! When first handed to the soldiers, the colours were blessed, during a special drum head parade. So what has this to do with our Stanley Chapel, and its colours? These colours, were highly valued, as they were decorated with the names of all successful past encounters, since the battalion's formation. The regiment is one of the oldest, and most decorated in the British Army, starting out in 1689 as the Prince of Wales Division. The name changed to the Fusiliers soon afterwards, using various spellings. The higher, rear WW1 colour, shown on the left of our cover, recalls the battles of Marne, Ypres, Somme, Vittorio Veneto, Gallipoli, Baghdad, Doiran, Egypt and Gaza. Some famous battles remembered on the lower, front 'colour' are even older: Inkerman and Sebastopol (Crimea): Peking (China), Lucknow (India), Corunna (Spain); Pyrenees, Toulouse and Waterloo (Napoleonic wars.) These are shown on the right of our cover. Our Battalion has a connection with Holyhead's Victoria Cross, which is the most prestigious British award for gallantry in the face of the enemy. Dr John Fox Russell was its Senior Officer, before transferring to the Medical Corps. While serving in Palestine, Captain Russell repeatedly went out to attend the wounded, under fire from snipers and machine-guns, and when no other help was at hand, carried them in single—handed, although almost exhausted. He showed the greatest possible degree of valour. He was killed in action on 6 November 1917, aged just 24 years old. The Royal Welch Fusiliers and the Royal Regiment of Wales were eventually disbanded in 2006, and all the Welsh battalions amalgamated to form the Royal Welsh. They still have the traditional ceremonial goat at the head of their band. During the fifties, at a special parade and service, the colours were "laid up" in our chapel. Although they appear to be in need of a clean, the Fusilier Museum at Caernarfon Castle advises against 'feather- dustering them', lest they totally and permanently, crumble into dust! Interesting historical JULY dates! July was named by the Roman Senate in honour of the Roman general Julius Caesar in 44 BC, as this was the month of his birth in either 100 or 102 BC. The month was previously called Ouintilis. On the 5th, Cecil J. Rhodes (1853-1902) was born at Bishop's Stortford, Hertfordshire, England. As a South African millionaire and politician, he was said to have once controlled 90 percent of the world's diamond production. His will established the Rhodes Scholarships at Oxford University for young scholars aged 18-25. Rhodesia was also named after him. On the 10th, in 1991 - Boris Yeltsin took the oath of office, becoming the first popularly elected president in Russia's thousand-year history. On the 10th, theologian and founder of Presbyterianism, John Calvin (1509-1564) was born in Novon, France, as Jehan Cauvin. On the 12th, British pottery designer Josiah Wedgwood (1730-1795) was born in Burslem, Staffordshire. On the 16th, British portrait painter Joshua Reynolds (1723-1792) was born in Plympton, Devon, On the 16th, Christian Science founder Mary Baker Eddy (1821-1910) was born near Concord, New Hampshire. On the 18th, Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela (1918 - 2013) was born, the son of a Thembu tribal chieftain, at Myezo, in South Africa. He became a lawyer, joined the African National Congress (ANC) in 1944, eventually becoming deputy national president in 1952. In 1964, he was convicted for sabotage as a result of his participation in the struggle against apartheid. He spent the next 28 years in iail, but remained a symbol of hope to South Africa's non-white majority. Released in 1990, he was elected President of South Africa in 1994 in the first election in which all races participated. He was often referred to as Madiba, which was his Xhosa clan name. On the 24th, French playwright and novelist Alexandre Dumas (1802-1870) was born in Villers-Cotterets, France. His works included *The Count of Monte Cristo* and The Three Musketeers.
