We continue this month, with our spotlight on a selection of our **magnificent stained glass windows**, from all our churches.

Who is the lady on this month's cover and where can you find her? She is St Bride/Brigid, (Welsh – St.Ffraid) the nun of Kildare, who lived from 451-525 AD. She was a contemporary of St Patrick, a remarkable woman, who earned her place in the male dominated list of saints in the Irish Celtic church, so that she was almost regarded as the second patron saint. Very little is known about her. She was born in Faughart, Ireland and was the daughter of Dubthatch. She founded the monastery at Kildare in AD490.at a time when monks and nuns lived in the same building. It was this Abbess Bride, who instigated the segregation of men and women in the monastery, thus beginning the cult of celibacy. St Ffraid, as she is known locally, is part of the striking east window, above the altar in her church in Trearddur Bay. Designed by Christopher Powell of London, the window was installed by John Jones of Blackbridge, Holyhead, in 1940, as the gift of Edward Dean, to the memory of his 'good and wise' mother Elizabeth, and was restored in 2000 by the company Classical Glass. Many legends and miracles were attributed to St Ffraid, some are depicted in the window by association. She stands on the square of turf upon which she reputedly crossed the Irish sea. She wears a white veil and mantle, which was said to have the image of God upon it. The oak leaves around her head is the symbol of Kildare. The flame held in her hands indicates the inextinguishable fire guarded by the nuns of Kildare. If you have never seen this window, why not pay a visit? (We are grateful to George Lees, for providing this interesting information and image.)

Interesting historical SEPTEMBER dates ! On the 2nd in 1666, the Great Fire of London began in a bakery in Pudding Lane near the Tower. On the 7th in 1822, Brazil declared its independence from Portugal after 322 years as a colony. On the 7th in **1986**, Bishop Desmond Tutu became Archbishop of Cape Town, South Africa, the first black head of South Africa's Anglicans. On the 7th in 1533, Queen Elizabeth I was born in Greenwich Palace. She ascended the throne in 1558 at age 25. During her reign, the Anglican Church was also fully established. On the 14th in **1741**, the composer George Frederick Handel finished the *Messiah* after working on it nonstop for 23 days. On the **16th** in **1620**, the *Mayflower* ship departed from England, bound for America with 102 passengers (half were dissenting Puritans, half were financial investors), and a small crew. After dangerous Atlantic storms, the Pilgrim Fathers disembarked at Plymouth on December 26th. On the **19th** in **1893**. New Zealand became the first country to grant women the right to vote. On the **28th** in **1066**, the Norman conquest of England began as Duke William of Normandy landed at Pevensey, Sussex. On the 29th in 1829, Britain's "bobbies" made their first public appearance. Greater London's Metropolitan Police force was established by an act of Parliament at the request of Home Secretary, Sir Robert Peel, after whom they were nicknamed. The force later became known as Scotland Yard, the site of their first headquarters.
