What do we show on our cover? Continuing with our theme of pilgrimage, this month we travel to Europe, to Santiago (St James) de Compostela, (the field of the star) the capital of Galicia in north western Spain. The Camino has been a famous pilgrimage route since the 9th century, and is a symbol of the Spanish Christians' struggle against Islam, between 711 and their final expulsion of the Moors in 1492. It takes between 30-35 days to walk the full length of the Way of St James, assuming you can cover about 26km each day. It can be achieved by any of about twelve routes, (for example, French, Portuguese, Northern, English etc.) which form the network leading from the home of the pilarim, to the shrine in the great Romanesque / Gothic / Baroque Cathedral, which traditionally houses the remains of the apostle St James the Great. During the middle ages, it was considered a very important pilgrimage, in the same league as Rome and Jerusalem. Some people set out for spiritual reasons, while others discovered spirituality along the way. James is one of the world's most popular saints, son of Zebedee, brother of St John the Evangelist and named by Christ as "one of the sons of thunder." Following the Crucifixion James travelled to preach the gospel in Spain and Portugal, named by the Romans, "Finis Terre", the end of the known world. He was beheaded in Jerusalem in 44AD, by Herod Agrippa, grandson of Herod the great. Legend has it that his remains were taken back to be buried in Compostela, in a stone, rudderless boat with no sail, by two disciples guided by two angels. Hundreds of years later, in 813 AD, a shepherd was led by a star to his burial place. The local bishop and king were notified, and the magnificent Cathedral was built on that exact site. It is one of only three known churches to be built over the tomb of one of Christ's apostles. The other two are St Peter's Basilica in Rome, and St Thomas Cathedral in Chennai, (formerly Madras,) in India. The scallop shell became the international symbol that a person had undertaken a pilgrimage to the shrine of St James. As well as serving the practical purpose of an implement for scooping water from streams, it has historically appeared on the accreditation given by the clergy to those who completed the pilgrimage. Apparently, during his lifetime, St James used a scallop shell to perform miracles of healing, by placing it on the affected part of the sufferer's body. Another interesting legend is that when his body was taken back to Spain for burial, the ship was destroyed by an extreme storm, but after a long period of time, St James's body was found undamaged on the sea shore, covered in scallop shells. Nowadays, the image of the shell is painted onto directional signs, to guide pilgrims on their way within the region. In French, the scallop is called Coquille St Jacques, and in German Jakobsmuscheln (James mussels). The ultimate souvenir of this pilgrimage is the much prized ornate "Compostela," presented in Santiago on completion of 62 miles walked, or 125 miles cycled, for spiritual reasons. As your credential, your "pilgrim passport" has to be stamped at each of your overnight accommodation stops - only a full set will suffice! If, however, your purpose was purely secular, you are given a very plain certificate by comparison! We hope you have enjoyed this mini break—without having to leave the comfort of your armchair!

Interesting historical November dates. On the 3rd, in 1718, John Montague, 4th Earl of Sandwich, was born in London. He ate the very first sandwich in 1778, refusing to leave the card table during an all night game. He told his servants to put meat between two slices of bread, so he could eat with one hand and continue to play with the other. The 4th is the feast day of **St Gwenfaen**. The **5**th is the feast day of **St Cybi**. On the **6**th in **1814**, Adolphe Sax was born – he invented the saxophone. On the 8th in **1895**, Wilhelm Roentgen, a German professor of physics discovered the Xray while experimenting with electricity. On the 11th in 1918, at the eleventh hour the Allies and the Central Powers ended WWI with the signing of an armistice agreement. People remember the millions of soldiers who died in the two World Wars and in other wars by wearing a poppy and taking part in a two minutes silence at **11am**. On **18th** in **1307** William Tell, a Swiss patriot, refused to pay homage to the Austrian Governor. As a punishment he was made to shoot an arrow through an apple placed on his son's head. Picking up his bow, William Tell aimed. His arrow split the apple, and his son's life was spared. "Stir up Sunday" – (taken from the collect of the day), the last Sunday before Advent, used to be the day in olden times, when every member of the family took a turn at stirring the Christmas pudding mixture, (from east to west in honour of the journey of the wise men), and making a wish. There were traditionally thirteen ingredients in the pudding, representing Christ and his twelve disciples.

Hallowtide celebrates the following dates; All Saints Day on 1 November. This feast day, to honour all saints, (persons of good will,) was started in 835 AD. The old words for all saints was "all hallows". Feasting started the evening before, 31 October, which was called "the eve of all hallows" - Hallowe'en. All Souls Day on 2 November: on this day, we remember all who have died. On 2 Nov 998, Odilo, Benedictine Abbot of Cluny, appointed the day to be set apart "for all the dead who have existed from the beginning of the world until the end of time" In the middle ages, poor Christians would offer prayers for the dead, in return for money or food, from their wealthier neighbours. When he was a child, Odilo was partially paralyzed and had to be carried by the family servants on a stretcher. One day while the family was travelling, they came to a church and Odilo was left with the luggage at the church door. The door was open, and little Odilo felt that God was calling him to crawl to the altar. He reached his goal, and tried to stand up, but failed. He tried again and finally succeeded and then was able to walk around the altar. It was believed that he had been cured of the unnamed malady by the intervention of Our Lady.!
