

Christmas is regarded as a religious celebration to observe the birth of Christ, by the majority of Christians throughout the world, and culturally by many non Christians. The season of Advent which precedes it, is regarded as the start of the liturgical year, and was used historically by some as a time of expectant waiting, even fasting, in preparation for the feast. The earliest known date for this observance of Advent was 480 AD. Although the month and date of Christ's birth is unknown, the church in 440AD fixed it as December 25. For Christians, believing that God came into the world in the form of man to atone for the sins of humanity, is the most important reason to celebrate Christmas, rather than knowing Jesus' exact birth date. The Romans marked the winter solstice on December 25. The first recorded Christmas celebration was in Rome on December 25, 336 AD. In the early middle ages, (5th –9th century,) Christmas day was overshadowed by the Epiphany on the 6th January. However the feast regained prominence when Charlemagne was crowned Emperor on Christmas Day 800. King Edmund the Martyr was later anointed on Christmas Day in 855 and King William I of England (the Conqueror) was crowned on Christmas Day 1066. The medieval calendar was filled with Christmas related holidays, and by the 12th century, the "twelve days of Christmas" had become an extremely popular annual event. By the High Middle Ages, about 1200AD, Christmas celebrations had become extremely popular. The Yule Boar was a centrepiece of these feasts; carolling was much enjoyed and was usually performed by dancers who sang, with a lead singer backed with a chorus. In England, gifts were exchanged on New Year's Day, and there was special Christmas Ale. Ivy, holly and other evergreens were widely used as decorations. In 1223, Francis of Assisi assembled a Nativity scene outside his church in Italy, and children sang carols. This event grew larger each year, eventually featuring drama as well as music. The custom spread throughout Europe, and people travelled long distances to enjoy it. By the 17th century, lavish dinners were served, and elaborate masques and pageants were enjoyed. During the Reformation, approx 1550, many Protestants believed the gift bringer was the Christ child, and the date of exchanging gifts was changed from 6 Dec to Christmas Eve. Later during the Protestant Reformation. Puritans banned Christmas in England in 1647, associating it with drunkenness and other rowdiness! It was however restored as a legal holiday in England in 1660 when the throne was restored to Charles II, but still remained disreputable in the minds of many people. In 1640, the Scottish Parliament officially discouraged the observance of Christmas, and it was not until 1958, that Christmas again became a Scottish public holiday. In the rest of the UK, Christmas Day became a bank holiday in 1834. Boxing Day, the day after Christmas, was added in 1871. Festive decorations have developed in many ways over the years. Nativity scenes were first used in 10th century Rome. In Sicily, living nativity scenes are still a more popular alternative to static crèches. The traditional colours of Christmas decorations are red, green, and gold. Red symbolizes the blood of Jesus, which was shed in his crucifixion; green symbolizes eternal life, in particular the evergreen tree, which does not lose its leaves in the winter; and as one of the three gifts of the Magi, gold is the first colour associated with Christmas, symbolizing royalty. The first record of a Christmas tree used by German Lutherans in the Cathedral of Strassburg, exists from 1539. The Star of Bethlehem is remembered as we put a star on top of our tree; for a different reason some prefer to choose an angel. The poinsettia, popular since the 16th century, is known in Mexico, its country of origin as the Flower of the Holy Night. Window candles and Christmas lights, demonstrate the fact that Christians believe that Jesus Christ is the ultimate light of the world.

Interesting historical December dates. On the 1st in 1135, King Henry 1 died after eating too many lampreys (fish that tasted like squid.) On the 2nd in 1697, the rebuilt St Pauls Cathedral in London, was opened. On the 4th, in 1872, the deserted ship the Mary Celeste was found drifting in the Atlantic. On the 5th in 1905, the roof of Charing Cross railway station in London collapsed, killing five people. On the 6th in 1921, Ireland's 26 southern states were granted independence from Britain. Ulster in the north remained part of the UK. On the 7th in 1783, William Pitt became both the British Prime Minister and Chancellor at the very young age of 24. On the 12th in 1955, British engineer Christopher Cockerell patented the "Hovercraft", half ship, half aircraft. On the 16th in 1773, unruly American colonists emptied 342 chest of tea into the sea – forever named the Boston Tea Party! On the 24th in 1508, London houses received piped water again, the first time in 1000 years since the Romans left! On the 25th in 440, church leaders fixed the birth date of Christ. Previously it had been celebrated in either January or May.
