What do we show on this month's cover? The moveable feast of Pentecost will take place this year on Sunday, 23 May. The name comes from the Greek, and literally means fifty (days after Easter.) From a historical perspective, Christianity didn't start with Jesus' birth, his death, his resurrection or his ascension. It started at Pentecost! This was the day the Holy Spirit entered a room full of apostles, alighting on each one, enabling him to speak in tongues, so that Christ's missionary work could be carried out throughout the then known world! The Christian Roman emperor Constantine apparently died on Pentecost Sunday, in the year 337. The dove is a traditional symbol of the Holy Spirit, linking with the account of Christ's baptism. The other symbol is fire, associated with 'the noise like a strong, driving wind which was heard all through the house where they were seated. Tongues as of fire appeared which parted and came to rest on each of them.' Medieval Christians dramatized both the dove and flames of fire. In France, when the priest intoned the words "Come, Holy Ghost," trumpets would blow, signifying the violent wind of which the scriptures speak. Cathedrals built in the Middle Ages often featured a Holy Ghost hole, which was a circular hole in the roof, in honour of the Holy Ghost's entrance into the room from above on Pentecost. A great swinging disk with a beautiful image of a dove would descend, and remain suspended above the middle of the church. From the same opening would follow a shower of flowers, representing the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and water symbolizing baptism. Some towns in central Europe even dropped pieces of burning straw, representing the flaming tongues of Pentecost. This custom eventually died out, as more and more churches and worshipers caught fire, literally as well as spiritually! 'Whitsun' is thought to have a double meaning. It derives from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit', meaning 'understanding', to celebrate the disciples being filled with the wisdom of the Holy Spirit. It was also a day for baptisms, when participants would dress in white, as well as confirmations and ordinations. In the middle ages, pomegranates, indicating the sweetness of heaven and the promise of eternal life, were often eaten on this day. According to legend, King Arthur always gathered all his knights at the round table for a feast and a quest on Pentecost. People living in Pentecost Island usually celebrate their island's name-day with a special church service followed by cultural events such as dancing. It is one of the 83 islands that make up the South Pacific nation of Vanuatu. It was so called because that was the day on which the island was first sighted by Europeans. In the north west of England, church and chapel parades called Whit Walks have taken place traditionally on the Friday after Whitsun. Additionally, Whit Fairs also took place, as well as Morris dancing and cheese rolling. This latter sport was very popular in Gloucestershire. From the top of a


ing and cheese rolling. This latter sport was very popular in Gloucestershire. From the top of a hill, a 7–9 pounds round of Double Gloucester cheese was sent rolling down the hill, a length of 200 yards. Competitors then raced down the hill, and the first person over the finish line at the bottom of the hill won the cheese. The aim was to catch the cheese; however, it had around a one-second head start and reached speeds up to 70 miles per hour, enough to knock over and injure a spectator. Two possible origins have been proposed for this annual event. The first is said that it evolved from a requirement for maintaining grazing rights on the common; the second is said to be a pagan fertility rite to encourage the fruits for the harvest. This has now become a world-famous event, with winners coming from Canada, Australia, and Nepal and even a former 'All Blacks 'international rugby player from New Zealand!
