

Christmas – then and now! An annual Christian holiday, celebrated all over the world, to remember the birth of Jesus Christ. The date was chosen by the Roman Catholic Church many years after his death. The use of evergreen Christmas trees, wreaths and garlands goes way back to the Egyptians and Romans, reminding us of the continuity of life and nature through the darkest days of winter, and anticipating that spring will return. The use of modern Christmas trees started in Germany in the 16th century, when they were decorated with fruits and nuts, instead of the glitzy decorations we use today. In 1848, Prince Albert introduced this custom of his homeland to his wife Queen Victoria, and a drawing of the family admiring the decorated tree, appeared in the Illustrated London News. Nowadays, people sometimes consider using the written name Xmas to be a rather slovenly, secular habit. It was however started in the 16th century, and in the Greek alphabet, the name Christ begins with the letter 'X', or Chi. So not sloppy at all, but rather intellectual! For children, Christmas is all about receiving presents. Santa Claus is based on the legend of St Nicholas, a fourth century Christian bishop who used his large inheritance, to provide for the poor and needy. He loved children, and brought them gifts secretly at Christmas. Why were stockings hung on the mantelpiece at Christmas? A poor man didn't have enough money to pay for his three daughters' dowries. The girls had washed their stockings and hung them before the fire to dry. Generous St Nicholas dropped a bag of gold down the chimney, and the coins ended up in the stockings. The Christmas wreath represents the crucified Christ's crown of thorns, and eventually the Christmas colours of red, green and gold were added. Red represents his blood, green symbolises life and gold signifies royalty. Next time that you sing carols, moving from door to door, remember that it stems from the old custom of wassailing, or toasting someone's good health and fortune! When making Christmas cakes, always stir the mix in an east to west direction, following the journey of the wise men. Druids considered mistletoe to be an aphrodisiac, a symbol of fertility, virility, love and laughter. The traditional kiss under the mistletoe is a way of asking for the blessings of the spirits of Christmas. Why are there twelve days of Christmas? It took the three kings that length of time to make the journey, from their home to the stable! The iconic spruce tree that graces Trafalgar Square each year, is an exceptionally generous Christmas gift. Each year, since 1947, the people of Norway have donated a tree in gratitude for Britain's support for Norway in the second world war. During WW2 the US Playing Card Co joined with American and British intelligence agencies to create very special decks of cards. They appeared to be Christmas gifts, but when wet, individual cards peeled apart, to reveal maps of escape routes, thus helping allied POWs escape from German camps. Fascinating! .
