What do we show on this month's cover? On the left we see a palm frond, healthy, green and vibrant. The crowd enthusiastically waved these while watching Jesus ride triumphantly into Jerusalem on a donkey, the Sunday before Holy Week and Easter Day. Various countries around the world now celebrate Palm Sunday in different ways! Palm trees don't grow in **Poland**, so people create artificial ones and decorate them with tissue paper flowers and ribbons. Some can be taller than 30 metres, and need a group of people to carry just one! In the **Philippines**, palm fronds are decorated and woven into complicated shapes. They are then blessed and taken home for good luck! People in **Norway** decorate their homes with birch twigs and painted eggs. They might take the Holy Week off from work, and travel to holiday areas for skiing, reading and family time. In the **Netherlands**, the rooster is celebrated. Children process carrying crosses decorated with ribbons, and topped with a rooster made from bread! In Latvia, Pussy Willows replace palms. Parents jokingly wake their children swatting them with willow branches. Celebrations n the island of Haiti, are a mix of Catholic and Voodoo traditions, involving travelling bands playing drums, maracas and trumpets. In Finland, children dress as Easter witches to trick or treat, offering willow branches in exchange for candy! In **Bulgaria**, willow branches and flowers are used to decorate homes. Family dinners are enjoyed on the day. On the right of our cover, we see a cross, dark and menacing, representing one of the most excruciating deaths imaginable, which happened to Jesus on Good Friday, just five days after Palm Sunday. Around the world, many Christians mark Good Friday by taking part in processions and re-enacting Christ's last journey before he was crucified. In Paris, crowds enact the Stations of the Cross along the banks of the River Seine. In **Nairobi**, Kenyans process along streets. Here in the UK, pilgrims carry crosses to the Holy Island of Lindisfarne in Northumberland. In Banda Acah, Indonesia a local man portraying Jesus, is tied to a cross. In the **Spanish Basque Country**, hundreds of people re-enact Christ's Passion. In Amritsar, India, women process carrying wooden crosses in front of their upper bodies. In the **Czech republic**, Christians process wearing face masks, and because church bells are silent on the day, huge wooden rattles are pushed around the streets to create a respectful sound. In some parts of **Spain**, penitents wear tall pointed head dresses dating back to the fifteenth century, which allows sinners to repent without being identified. Many countries fast and pray, holding services in the afternoon to remember the hours Christ hung on the cross. Churches in some parts of the world, ring the day in with 33 peals, one for each day of Christ's life on earth. There is no Eucharist on Good Friday – its absence honours Christ's Passion and death. Why is the day so called? Possibly from "God's Friday," or maybe because the death represents the ultimate act of love, that Jesus died to pay the price of human kind's sins. It is one of the oldest Christian holidays, and has been observed since 100 AD

We pray that you will all enjoy a peaceful blessed Easter!
