Who do we show on this month's cover? The Roman Emperor Constantine the Great, with left hand outstretched, indicating the cross illuminating the sky, above the Milvian Bridge, which crossed the River Tiber in Rome. As there are several versions of these events, written by reputable historians, I will continue with the generally most accepted. On the 28 October 312AD, a battle took place between the armies of two of the regional reigning Roman emperors, Constantine 1 and Maxentius, to determine who would be the single undisputed emperor of Rome. Although they were brothers in law, their relationship was extremely hostile. On the night before the battle, Constantine was visited by an angel showing a crucifix, a vision by the Christian God, promising victory, if the sign of the CHI-RHO (the first two letters of Christ's name in Greek) was painted on the soldiers' shields. It looked like an X with a longtailed P running midway from top to bottom. "By this sign, you will conquer!" This sign has been found in very early Christian catacombs. Maxentius fell from the bridge, and drowned due to his heavy armour! The chronicler Eusebius allegedly heard this version from the emperor himself. Constantine won the battle, but as he did not know which god had been his saviour, he consulted with bishops who regularly travelled with his army. They assured him that the cross was the symbol of Jesus Christ's triumph over death. From that day on, he devoted himself completely to God: Christian priests became his closest advisors. He was welcomed back into Rome as the undisputed master of the western Roman Empire, and during his brief stay, he did not make any sacrifices to Roman gods. He also ordered the restitution of property confiscated from Christians during previous persecutions. Constantine was instrumental in constructing the Edict of Milan, six months after the battle, which granted everyone in the Roman Empire, the right to worship any god they chose. In 313, Constantine made Christianity an officially recognised and tolerated religion, which paved the way for it to become the dominant religion of the Roman Empire, and ultimately for Europe, in 380 AD, forty three years after his death. At the time of his conversion, one third of the Roman Empire was thought to be Christian. Compare this with the down trodden religious sect that had suffered such appalling persecution, at the hands of so many of Constantine's predecessors. The emperor's new faith became the cornerstone of his imperial policy. He donated large sums of his personal wealth to enlarging and decorating Christian churches. He became a benefactor to the poor, giving them money, food and clothing. He outlawed infanticide, the abuse of slaves and peasants, crucifixion and he made Sunday a day of rest. Although he embraced the faith in mid life, he chose not to be baptised until he was on his death bed, aged 65. And to think that all this happened 1700 years ago!

All will be welcome at our Walsingham Mass at 11.30 am on Saturday, 12th November, at St Cybi. This will be our annual mass to remember and give thanks for, members who have passed on! Interesting November Dates: On the 3rd, 1942, British Field Marshall Bernard Montgomery's troops broke through the front line of Erwin Rommel's Afrika corps, capturing 9000 prisoners. On the 4th, 1843, the 5.5metre statue of Lord Nelson was hauled to the top of its 60 metre column in Trafalgar Square, London. On the 7th, 1917 Bolshevic Red Guards seized control of the Winter Palace and confirmed Vladimir Ilyich Ulyanov (Lenin) as leader of Russia. On the 9th, 1953, flamboyant Welsh bard Dylan Thomas died at the age of 39. Heavy drinking and wild living contributed to his early death. On the 14th,1940, in one raid 449 German Luftwaffe bombers dropped 503 tons of bombs and 881 incendiaries onto the English city of Coventry. On the 16th ,1724, highway man Jack Sheppard was hanged at Tyburn, London in front of an estimated 200,000 people. On the 23rd, 1910, American born Dr Hawley Harvey Crippen was hanged at Pentonville Prison, after poisoning his wife and dismembering her body. On the 27th, 1875, Britain bought shares worth £4 million, in the Suez Canal company.
