

**Easter** is the most important Christian festival. It iovfully celebrates Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead, three days after he was executed by crucifixion. Unlike Christmas, it does not have a fixed date. So how is the date of Easter calculated? Christian churches in the West celebrate Easter on the first Sunday following the full moon after the vernal equinox on March 21. It is believed that the word 'Easter' may come from 'Eostre' the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring, who had festivals held in her honour during April. Lent is the season of reflection and preparation for the celebration of Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts for forty days, replicating Christ's withdrawal into the desert, when Satan tried his best to bring him down by temptation. According to various Christian denominations, Lent has traditionally also been a period of fasting, or at least a time of sacrificing luxuries. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, recalling how the crowd enthusiastically waved palm branches, while watching Jesus ride triumphantly into Jerusalem on a donkey, to celebrate the historic Jewish feast of Passover. This connects us to the Old Testament, recalling the exodus of the Jews out of slavery in Egypt and the sparing of the first born children. In the middle ages, the days approaching Easter were predictably spent mostly in church. In Holy Week, the days from Wednesday onwards were described as "darkness." The Maundy Thursday service would involve bare altars, but adorned with twigs and branches, symbolising the stripping and scourging of Jesus. Good Friday's service was a day of mourning, where generally nobody would use any iron tools or nails. No Eucharist would take place but a reading would be made from the Gospel of John. The service would be held in almost entire darkness, with one candleholder gradually being put out to symbolise darkness falling on the world. The centremost candle would remain lit, representing the light of Christ. The service would progress with the congregation kneeling in the nave with the priest praying in Latin. Easter Sunday services would commence at dawn with hymn singing outside the church. In the medieval period, it was forbidden to eat eggs in Lent, so on Easter Sunday, eggs were considered an important part of the feasting celebrations, especially in poorer families who could not afford meat. In the late 16th century, the Protestant reformer Martin Luther organised egg hunts for his congregation. Apparently, men would hide eggs for women and children to find, - a nod to the fact that it was women who discovered the empty tomb on Easter morning. In parts of modern day Switzerland, a Biblical passion play is staged on Maundy Thursday. The next day on Good Friday, a procession takes place, where people carry two sculptures - one of the dead Christ and one of his Mother Mary, through the streets. Another tradition that is specific to western Switzerland is called 'weeping women'. Crimson cushions, bearing the symbols of Christ's passion, are carried through the streets. The cushion contains nails used in the crucifixion, the crown of thorns that was placed on his head and the handkerchief that St. Veronica used to wipe Christ's brow as he carried the cross (which was also incredibly imprinted with the image of his face). Good Friday recalls crucifixion-one of the most excruciating deaths imaginable. (The core of the word "cruc" is self explanatory) Many countries fast and pray, holding services in the afternoon to remember the hours Christ hung on the cross. Churches in some parts of the world, ring the day in with 33 peals, one for each day of Christ's life on earth. Why is the day so called? Possibly from "God's Friday," or maybe because the death represents the ultimate act of love, that Jesus died to pay the price of human kind's sins. It is one of the oldest Christian holidays, and has been observed since 100 AD. Flowers are one of the joys of Easter. The white Easter Lily, religiously symbolic, is referred to as the 'white robed apostle of hope'. The colour characterises Christ's purity. The five petals of the white rose symbolise the five wounds which he received before and during the crucifixion. The purple crocus signifies royalty. Red tulips mean love. White tulips portray forgiveness. May we all enjoy flowers at Easter!
