What do we show on our front cover? Historically, the rather morose season of Lent, marked by fasting, prayer and sacrifice was transformed joyfully on Easter Day. This central Christian tradition commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ three days after his crucifixion. Unlike the fixed date of Christmas, it is a moveable feast, celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox, on 21 March. It can therefore fall on any Sunday between March 22 and April 25. This decision was made in 325AD by the Emperor Constantine at the Council of Nicaea. Many secular Easter traditions like eggs and bunnies have pre Christian / pagan origins of renewal of life and fertility. As long ago as the Neolithic age (10,000 BC.) European tradition tells that hares were ritually buried beside humans, as they represented rebirth. More recently in 51 BC Julius Caesar commented that Britons did not eat hares, due to their religious significance. However, by the 1600s AD things had changed radically. Written accounts at the time mention traditional Easter hare hunts and the eating of hare meat. One tradition known as the hare pie scramble, took place in a village in Leicestershire. It involved baking a hare pie and people scrambling for a slice! In 1790 the local parson tried to stop the custom, due to its pagan connections, but he was unsuccessful, and the custom continues to this day! In the medieval period, it was forbidden to eat eggs during Lent, so to eat eggs on Easter Sunday was a special treat. In present day America, children look for special treats that the Easter bunny may have left behind. Easter egg hunts possibly began in the 16th century, when Martin Luther hid eggs for women and children to find, symbolising it was a woman who first entered the empty tomb. Although chocolate eggs were common in France and Germany in the early 19th century, in the UK the first was produced by John Cadbury in 1842. The name of the Anglo Saxon goddess of spring Eostre (Ostara) whose festival occurred around the time of the spring equinox, possibly gave rise to the name Easter. The Venerable Bede in the 8th century (731AD) believed this. The gospels indicate that Christ was crucified during the week of Passover, so Easter usually occurs around the time of that Jewish festival, which commemorates the Israelites' liberation from Egypt. Early Christians, many of whom were Jewish linked Jesus' death to the Passover lamb and spiritual salvation. There is evidence to support the fact that Christians observed Easter (Pascha – Greek for Passover)) as early as the mid second century (just over 100 years after Christ's death and resurrection.) Various countries partake in interesting customs. On Good Friday, in western Switzerland, "weeping women" carry crimson cushions through the streets, bearing the symbols of Christ's passion: nails, a crown of thorns and the handkerchief used by St Veronica to wipe his brow, which then incredibly showed the imprint of his face. In Cyprus and Crete, bonfires were lit and a small doll representing Judas was thrown into the flames. In Poland, on Easter Saturday, families prepare a "blessing basket" This is filled with coloured eggs, sausages, bread and other important food which is taken to church to be blessed. Lent isn't over for them until the basket is blessed. On Good Friday, in the middle ages, no one was allowed to use iron tools or nails. Flowers are one of the joys of Easter. The white Easter Lily, religiously symbolic, is referred to as the 'white robed apostle of hope'. The colour characterises Christ's purity. The five petals of the white rose symbolise the five wounds which he received before and during the crucifixion. The purple crocus signifies royalty. Red tulips mean love. White tulips portray forgiveness. May we all enjoy flowers at Easter!
